WEA wraps up another successful Representative Assembly

Last weekend, 32 elected delegates from LWEA represented you at the annual WEA Representative Assembly (RA) in Spokane. The RA is a democratically-run meeting consisting of about 1,000 delegates from throughout the state who make decisions on the direction of WEA for the following year.

One of the highlights was a student-organized school safety rally that delegates participated in outside the Spokane Convention Center on April 20. Students and teachers gave moving speeches about how school shootings have affected them. One of the student speakers was from Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida.

Mary Yu, a Washington State Supreme Court Justice, was a keynote speaker on Saturday morning. Justice Wu spoke about the importance of public education and how teachers make such a huge difference in our students' lives. Mandy Manning, the 2018 National Teacher of the Year, also gave an inspiring speech about the work she does with immigrant students in Spokane.

Delegates approved the following:

- Dedicate time and resources on engaging members in the fight against antiunion forces.
- Show support for Arizona educators by wearing red on Thursday, April 26, and every Wednesday thereafter.
- Provide funding for grants for equity teams in local associations.
- Direct WEA to develop model contract language for ESAs (OTs, PTs, SLPS, psychologists, etc.).
- Provide training for building leaders.
- Lobby for legislation to reduce the school counselor ratio to 250:1.
- Lobby for legislation to implement the WA State Comprehensive School Counseling Program.
- Lobby for time spent on a non-continuing contract to count towards provisional status.
- Endorse the recommended school psychologist ratio of 500-700:1.
- Develop a conference specific to supporting the needs of educators of color.
- Provide 15 grants of up to \$500 for educators of color to attend conferences designed to support them.
- Update WEA belief statements on gun safety in light of recent tragic school shootings.
- Approve a statement that all people have the fundamental right to live free of fear from sexual violence and harassment.
- Approve statements on the importance of moving our schools towards becoming more inclusive and culturally responsive.


Did you get your ballot?

Important news about your annual leave

Your unused annual (personal) leave will be **automatically cashed out** at the sub rate of pay (\$175 per day). If you want to carry over days to next year, you must notify the district prior to June 30, indicating that you want to carry over your unused days (from the 2017-18 school year). Unused annual leave is carried over on a 1-for-1 basis.

Send your request to <u>leave@lwsd.org</u> – by June 30, 2018. Keep a copy of your e-mail and the auto-reply response from the District for your records.

Important - please note:

- You may only have a total of 5 days of annual leave in any school year. Since you get 3 new annual leave days in the fall, only 2 days can be carried over from any year. Any excess days will be cashed out.
- If you already have days that you've carried over from prior years, you
 MUST indicate that you want to continue to carry them over. If you do not
 notify the district, your carryover days will be cashed out.
- If you are interested in a combination (some cashed out and some carried over), you also MUST notify the district.
- Please don't contact the District to find out how many much unused annual leave you have remaining – you can easily <u>check your balance on Employee</u> Access.
- Be sure to send your request to <u>leave@lwsd.org</u>.
- You'll receive your annual leave cash out in your August paycheck.
